

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A MESSAGE FROM THE CHIEF

A Message From Chief R. Stacey Laforme

I have spoken about the strategic plan before but I want to reflect on it again and what it means to Membership and leadership.

The Mississaugas of the Credit are moving forward with a strategic plan that seeks to empower our Members, our organization and our Chief and Council. It is very much a time of change and we are preparing to take our rightful place in the areas of jurisdiction within the First Nation but also within our Treaty Lands and Territory. This requires trust, support, teamwork, inclusivity and strategic planning.

There has never been so many opportunities for this First Nation and we have never been in a better position to take advantage of those opportunities.

Under the strategic plan, seven pillars/areas have been approved to guide our First Nation into the future.

- 1. Wealth Creation
- 2. Nation wellbeing and wellness
- 3. Environment and sustainability
- 4. Education cradle to grave
- 5. Outreach and communication
- 6. Infrastructure and development
- 7. Governance

Culture and language, and the First Nation values are to be considered and incorporated across all pillars. Each Councillor is assigned as a specific pillar lead. The pillar lead is expected to move the nation forward and improve the nation under that specific pillar. Pillar leads are expected to work with full Council and to attend and be the political lead in meetings with both Provincial and Federal governments. The pillar lead will be expected to report to Membership, to Council and to media when required.

The support for a pillar comes from Chief and Council and the specific administrative department that is most closely associated with that pillar. The pillar is also supported by a team made up of staff, Members and outside resources as needed. An administrative governance unit is being developed that will be of further support to each pillar and to overall Chief and Council.

It is understood that it is essential to interact between the Councillor Pillar lead and administration to move



the nation forward, Chief and Council trust and rely on the administration to deal with the daily operations. The strategic plan is about empowerment at all levels and requires leadership that will work together, that will work with staff and that will provide strong, respectful leadership. Leadership that requires a commitment of 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

HISTORICAL TIDBIT By Darin Wybenga

The study of genealogy, or one's family history, is an absorbing hobby that occupies the spare time of millions of people worldwide. Hobbyists spend millions on subscription sites such as Ancestry. com to track down the records left behind that document the lives of their ancestors. While birth. marriage, and death records do much to frame out an ancestors life, they do little to add colour to the life of an individual. Fortunately, for the descendants of John LaForme, a document that provides some insight into the life of their ancestor does exist. In the late 1880s, an investigation to determine who had rights to band membership in the MCFN gathered information concerning the origins of many of the families of the First Nation- among those families was the family of John LaForme. The investigation provided information that any family historian would "drool over" as it contains the words of John LaForme telling his own story. His testimony was taken down by Inspector Dingman of the Indian Department on February 9, 1888 in the New Credit Council House.

John Laforme and his brother, Stephen LaForme, were two brothers of French Canadian origin, who lived among the Mississaugas at the Mission Village at the Credit River. When the Mississaugas moved to their present location, the LaForme brothers moved with them to "New Credit."

John Laform senr. sworn, said-

I am in my 90th year of age. I was born in the city of Quebec. I am clear French. My wife was Betsey Walker. She was a clear blooded Indian woman. She was the daughter of Chief Walker of a band of Indians living near the Rond Eau and I understood my wife was born in that part of the country. I was married to her by the late Peter Jones at the Old Credit. The principal men of the band received me and my family into the Band after we came here [New Credit]. This was done under the direction of the late Peter Jones, Chief, I personally shared in the interest money of the band after I came here. I was on the paylist only about three years. I was living with Betsey Walker quite a little while without being married. The late Rev. Peter Jones came to me and told me I would have to leave the Reserve [Old Credit] unless I got married. He told me this on a Saturday and the next day Sunday I got married to Betsey Walker. By the late Rev. Peter Jones in the Mission House on the Reserve. This was shortly after the late Rev. Peter Jones came to the Credit as a missionary. He also baptized my children. I had one child before I was married. ... I was with the Band of the Old Credit 9 or 10 years before the Band moved here. I and Betsev Walker went to Muncev Town to live before we were married and we lived there about two months. We got presents there once. I was admitted into the Band here within two months after I came here. I was taken off the list through a mistake of Wm. Herchmer."

Although census records vary, they indicate that

John LaForme was born in Quebec around 1800. His death is listed in the New Credit Church records as occurring 12 April, 1897, at the age of 99 years. With his wife Betsey Walker, he had four sons: James (d. 1812), John (1838-1912), David (1847-1915). Alexander (1851-1889) and a daughter, Angelic (1846-?). If one

were to add up the descendants of John and Betsey that have been band members of the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation the total would exceed 1200 people. Fall Harvest CULTURE AND HISTORY

Canada delays justice for First Nations children and families

ANISHINABEK NATION HEAD OFFICE (October 15, 2019) - Anishinabek Nation Grand Council Chief Glen Hare says he is extremely disappointed with Canada's decision to appeal the recent Canadian Human Rights Tribunal (CHRT) ruling ordering the federal government to pay compensation to First Nation children, youth and families.

"This appeal will cause major delays to justice for First Nation children and families," states Grand Council Chief Hare. "Not only has the federal government applied for a judicial review, they have requested the CHRT's decision be set aside and that monetary compensation be dismissed altogether. It's extremely disappointing."

The recent CHRT ruling was the latest ruling in a historic human rights case filed in 2007 by the First Nations Child & Family Caring Society of Canada and the Assembly of First Nations. In September of this year, the CHRT ordered Canada to provide \$40,000 in compensation to all First Nation children who were unnecessarily placed into out-of-home care from January 1, 2006 to a date that is to be determined by the CHRT. Parents or guardians of these children could also be eligible for compensation.

"Canada may have acknowledged its discriminatory funding and practices, but this appeal shows they are unwilling to fulfill their obligation to our children and families for the irreversible pain and suffering it has caused."

The Anishinabek Nation is a political advocate for 40 member First Nations across Ontario, representing approximately 65,000 citizens. The Anishinabek Nation is the oldest political organization in Ontario and can trace its roots back to the Confederacy of Three Fires, which existed long before European contact.

In May of 2019, songwriters Logan Staats, Rob Lamothe and Suzie Miller went to 8 classes in 4 schools to talk with students about water.

This was the beginning of a collaborative art project that would include over 250 people. In the classrooms they sat in circles, talked about treaties and family, trees and turtles, swimming and dreaming. On the bank of the Grand River they sat with more people and heard about childhood memories made on the shores of Lake Erie, love and connection, fears for the future.

Over the summer Logan and Rob played music, travelling north to Webique First

Nation, west to Vancouver, south to California. In the fall they wrote 'Song For The Water' outside, with the birds and the yellow jackets, beside Staats lake at Logan's house at Six Nations of the Grand River Territory.

Three-century-old North York tree turned into wood art for Canada 150

A 300-year-old red oak tree is going to be cut down and turned into wood art just in time for Canada's 150.

The tree is one of two 300-yearold red oaks that have been in the Mississauga's First Nation's history even when the British army was in Canada, circa 1812; the sister tree is located on Coral Gable Drive.

Madeleine McDowell is a Canadian historian that has researched about the red oak's history in Mississauga and was present during the tree cutting.

She said Canadian explorer Alexander Henry led a group of First Nations from Mississauga to the Treaty of Fort Niagara in 1764.

"They would have gone by this tree," McDowell said. "It took them one day to run from Lake Simcoe to what is now Lake Ontario."

Trevor Comer, who is a member of the CPLC 12 Division and a woodcarver, sawed the tree to be used for art.

The chunks will be delivered to different artists in Canada to repurpose the wood and create art for Canada's 150th birthday.

"I want to make a large acorn out of one of the chunks," Comer said. "Different carvers and different artists will be taking the other parts of the tree."

A carbon print of the tree will also be made by Cameron McCuaig who is a volunteer for Mississauga's heritage advisory committee and also a treecut artist.

"Cameron did a print of the Maple Leaf Forever Tree," Comer said. "He will fingerprint the tree using the cross-section of the tree and use its own carbon to make a print. You can count how many rings there are and see the interesting lines in the grain."

The tree, which was recognized as a heritage tree in 2010, was partially cut down in August 2016 because the city deemed it a hazard.

Most of the branches were cut off last year, but the



owner of the tree wants the red oak to be cut low enough for it to be used as a table.

McDowell wishes for the tree to stay as tall as it can.

"It's not likely to happen," McDowell said, "Something that big that makes you feel a little bit humble is nice to have in the community. If it's low like a table, you won't get that humility."

Although most of the tree will be cut, it cannot be uprooted because it is holding up the hill that part of the residential area is built.

The buildings around the tree will collapse into the Humber River, which is located nearby, if the roots are pulled.

The CPLC members hope Canadians will be able to see the history of the 300-year-old tree within the wood art that artists have created, as well as within the living sister tree.

The above wooden book was presented to the Mississaugas of the Credit this past month.

Massey College is located on the treaty lands of the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation and in June of 2018 took an active role to further Truth and Reconciliation and invited the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation to take up an office at the college.

It serves as a base that will enable MCFN officials to visit and conduct business in the city of Toronto.

On Friday, Oct. 25, 2019, the Mississaugas of the Credit invited guests from Turtle Island to attend the MCFN Massey College Office Open House.

"It is a privilege and a pleasure to open our office at Massey College," said MCFN Chief R. Stacey Laforme, who was appointed an honorary Senior Fellow of Massey College in 2017. "We wish to replicate this office in other locations throughout our treaty lands. Selecting Massey as the first location in Toronto feels

right and makes a lot of sense because of the strong relationship we have already forged. I look forward to many interactions with the diverse Massey College and University of Toronto communities, as well as with the many people and organizations who call

Toronto home. It is good to be back!"

"Our partnership with the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation presents many rich opportunities for compelling conversations and collaborations," said Nathalie Des Rosiers, Principal of Massey College. "We welcome the Mississaugas to Massey, and we look forward to continuing our work advancing reconciliation."



The Lieutenant Governor shared a poem written by Stacey Laforme, Chief of the Mississaugas of the Credit, while retired Court of Appeal Justice Harry LaForme explained the significance and the importance of the land acknowledgement. Finally, Chief Laforme recited one of his poems about identity, a poem that speaks so well to all of us, and particularly to Junior Fellows. He spoke of not being framed by others, and of knowing who one truly is by looking inside.

Massey College is also home to the third Chapel Royal in Canada. Named the Queen's Anishinaabek Sacred Place, the chapel commemorates the Royal Proclamation of 1763 and the Treaty of Niagara of 1764—thereby acknowledging the nation-tonation relationship in that proclamation, as well as the complex and often painful history between the Crown and Indigenous nations, and the need for continued acts of reconciliation.



Immediately following the ceremony, guests were given a tour of the Mississaugas of the Credit – Massey College office and the Chapel Royal at Massey College. The space will be used to acknowledge the history of the Royal Proclamation of 1763 and its ratification through the 1764 Treaty of Niagara. The treaty, through its association with the Silver Covenant Chain of Friendship, represented a relationship of respect between Indigenous Nations and the Crown in the Great Lakes region.

Massey College decorated the Chapel Royal as a reflection of the partnership between the College and the Mississaugas of the Credit with guidance from MCFN Elder and former MCFN Chief Carolyn King and Chief Stacey Laforme. There are two glass mosaic windows whose design is based on the Silver Convenant Chain and on the Anishinaabe symbol of the Council of Three Fires. Tobacco bundles are kept in the Chapel in a beautiful wooden bowl of Ontario Silver Maple. The medicines are wrapped in a square red cotton cloth (red is the colour reserved for honoured guest) and tied with a deep purple ribbon (symbolizing the chapel's relationship with the Queen and her family) Outside the Chapel, a new mural leads the entrance from the upper foyer to the Chapel. A beautiful visual introduction to the story of the proclamation and treaty created by Philip Cote. The mural tells a story of the Treaty of Niagara

through an Indigenous perspective illustrating the negotiation process.

The Chapel Royal serves as a reminder of the constant need to find ways to promote and cement reconciliation with Indigenous and non-Indigenous groups and on June 12, 2019 a commemorative plaque was presented by the Ontario Heritage Trust to commemorate the day's event and reads "A Council at the Royal Chapel. Honouring the kinship kindled by the treaty relationships between First Peoples, and the Crown, Indigenous leaders gathered here on June 11, 2019, with the Governor General, Lieutenant Governors, and Territorial Commissioners of Canada to hear an address by the National Chief of the Assembly of First Nations." A Sacred Fire burned to mark the unprecedented council.

They came from the Great Lakes and northeast woodlands regions to negotiate the 1764 Treaty of Niagara.

The Treaty of Niagara was negotiated between the Crown and the Indigenous nations as a response to the direction set by King George III in the Royal Proclamation of 1763. The objective was to affirm the relationship between the Crown and Indigenous peoples in the aftermath of the Seven Years War.

The Silver Covenant Chain of Friendship acknowledged the relationship between King George III and the Indigenous nations of the Great Lakes. It describes a relationship of nation-to-nation equality and respect. In some Indigenous traditions, a wampum belt is used as a method of negotiation.

This treaty was intended to be the foundation of all future treaties in the lands that now constitute Canada. Unfortunately, however, that did not happen. Massey's Chapel Royal advocates reconciliation by acknowledging and respecting the integrity of the original Treaty of Niagara.

Covenant Prayer

Entryway Glass Mosaic

The artwork is inspired by the 1764 Silver Covenant Chain of Friendship wampum belt presented by Sir William Johnson (representing the Crown) at the Treaty of Niagara.

The chain is artistically featured in the work. In the design, the covenant chain is in the process of becoming a circle, seeking reconciliation. Hence the word Prayer in the title.

The ends of the chain are shaped like leaves and are full of new stories.



The "Council Fire" springs from the earth and is set on a background of fiery silver, copper and gold leaf.

The mosaic is made with hand-made Byzantine smalti, glass beads, Murano millefiori and silver, copper and gold leaf.

All 7000 pieces were cut and set by hand at the Sarah Hall Studio in Toronto.





Secret Path Week Walk for Wenjack 2019



For over 150 years, residential schools operated in Canada. Over 150,000 children attended these schools. Many never returned. Often underfunded and overcrowded, these schools were used as a tool of assimilation by the Canadian state and churches. A very cruel experiment. Thousands of students suffered physical, mental, and sexual abuse. All suffered from loneliness and a longing to be home with their families. The damages inflicted by these schools continue to this day.

One of those students was Chanie "Charlie" Wenjack, and we have been especially moved by his story. Chanie was born January 19, 1954. He died October 22, 1966, near Redditt, ON. An Anishinaabe boy, at age 12 he ran away from his residential school and subsequently died from hunger and exposure to the weather. All Chanie wanted was to go home, which was over 600 km away in Ogoki Post on the Marten Falls First Nation. His death sparked national attention and the first inquest into the treatment of Indigenous children in Canadian residential schools.

Inspired by the "Secret Path" story and Gord Downie's humility, sincerity, and determination to tell the story of all youths from the residential school era who never made it home, let's come together and participate in




a spiritual journey called #walkforwenjack in Toronto, ON. The Walk For Wenjack first set out on Nov 20-21, 2016 and retraced the steps of Chanie Wenjack. It started at the Cecillia Jeffrey Indian Residential School in Kenora, ON, and continued to Redditt, ON for a ceremony representing Chanie's final resting spot near Farlane, ON.

Secret Path Week was Oct 17-22, 2019 - a national movement commemorating the legacies of Gord Downie and Chanie Wenjack. The Gord Downie and Chanie Wenjack Fund would like to inspire Legacy Schools, Legacy Space partners, and all Canadians to use this week to answer Gord Downie's call to action to "do something"

Councillor William Bill LaForme Pillar Five Lead - Inclusive Leadership and Governance

Aanii everyone.

Council has been hard at work redeveloping the process by which it is undertaking its Governance work. Along with the realignment of MCFN's Departments and the implementation of the Pillar system, Council has also redeveloped its Governance working group and created a Governance Committee made up of Chief Stacey Laforme, myself, the MCFN Chief Operating Officer, and the recently hired Governance Project Coordinator.



This Governance Committee had its first meeting in mid-October and already has a lot on the go! The

Committee has established a process that will hopefully ensure the foundational aspects of MCFN's governance structure is in place, prior to tackling more specific projects and work as identified by Council.

Working under a 6 month work plan, the Committee hopes to have its Terms of Reference finalized and approved by Council, fill a number of positions to support MCFN's governance work, as well as draft some core processes for ratifying and passing laws, and develop a manual for new and returning Council members, in the coming weeks and months.

The Governance Committee is also hoping to meet with the grade seven and eight class at LSK for assistance in establishing some guiding principles on relationship building for Council members and staff at MCFN and begin the process of creating a disciplinary tribunal to address any disputes that may arise among staff, Council, or community members. Such a model will be drafted and in the ready, for the new Council to sanction, if it so chooses, in January 2020.

Council has also approved the continuation of

work on MCFN's land claims and the Land Claims Committee will be meeting with personnel from Canada in mid-November.

Media Advisory: Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation Unveils New Logo (for immediate release)

(Hagersville, Ont.) - Effective Oct. 18, 2019, the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation (MCFN) is moving forward with a revised logo with the word "new" taken out of the logo.

In January 2019, we reverted back to using our original name, "Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation."

The logo had remained unchanged until this time. We are now moving forward with the use of a logo that properly reflects the name of our community.

The contributing artists to this beautiful logo are MCFN community members Kyle Sault and Chief R. Stacey Laforme, with graphics by Shelda Martin.

Background

After several years of consultation, the logo of the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation was accepted in 1993. The Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation is part of the Ojibwe (Anishinaabe) Nation. The symbols on the logo are representative of important aspects of our Nation's history:

- Eagle: the Eagle is used because it is the predominant totem of Mississaugas of the Credit First
 Nation. The Eagle is viewed as the messenger—the Mississaugas were once considered to be
 great messengers, some days, traveling up to 80 miles on foot.
- Three Fires: the three fires is symbolic of the Mississaugas' traditional and political alliance with the Ojibwe, Odawa, and Pottawatomi Nations. A council, the Three Fires Council, was established and still exists today.
- The Circle of Life: within this category there are two aspects. One, First Nations teach that every
 living thing is related and interconnected—we are all a part of the Circle of Life. Secondly, the
 blue writing symbolizes the interconnectedness to the traditional territory of the Mississaugas
 of the Credit, the Credit River and Lake Ontario.
- The Peace Pipe: the Peace Pipe is the Mississauga People's equivalent of a Parliamentary Mace.
 The pipe was given to the Mississaugas' Peter Jones by Queen Victoria's cousin Augustus d'este.
 It is used in special opening ceremonies to thank the great spirit, mother earth, and the sun.

Councillor Evan Sault, Pillar Two Lead - Nation Well-Being and Wellness and Monthly Update

Aanii and Good Day to all my Fellow MCFN Members,

I hope everyone had an enjoyable Summer, Thanksgiving and a fun and safe Halloween.

I've been carrying a very busy schedule since June, but it's been spent on important issues in moving our Health, Social and Nation forward on a successful path in these areas. I absolutely enjoy being busy when it's helping our Nation improve in the areas in which I'm responsible for.



I'm going to touch on a few key projects that I've been working on:

MCFN Sports & Recreation Department: In July, I contacted the Minister of Sport, Kirsty Duncan, in regards to MCFN developing and establishing our own Sports & Recreation Department that would be annually funded. Minister Duncan responded and we met with her office staff in August. In this meeting I stressed that MCFN needs a Sports & Recreation Department. I said our membership is growing and that our youth have to go off MCFN for sports when we should be able to provide it here to them. I have requested a follow-up meeting with the Minister in order to keep pursuing this department. With a Sports & Recreation Department then MCFN could run annual sports clinics and camps (baseball, hockey, soccer, volleyball, basketball, golf, etc.) to see where heavy interest is, then one day we could possibly have our own minor teams in some sports. I continue to work on this and will keep the Nation updated on the progress.

MCFN Child Welfare Department: In August, I organized a meeting with our Chief Operating Officer and the Social and Health Services Director in order to start initial discussions on MCFN developing our OWN Child Welfare Department. We have had ongoing meetings and I have future meetings scheduled both internally and externally to help in pursuing this department. Right now we rely mainly on Brant FACS

and Haldimand for Child Welfare when I want to see us handling and dealing with our OWN Child Welfare Issues under our OWN terms and policies. If our children are our Future, then let's keep them here to grow, learn and prosper in their OWN Nation with Family and Friends. I know this will be a long process but I continue to work on this and will keep the Nation updated on the progress.

MCFN Community Peacekeepers/ Security Department: I organized an initial meeting with OPP Reps, the Chief and two Staff members in order to discuss

suggestions and ideas in regards to MCFN developing and establishing our OWN Community Peacekeepers/ Security Department. I'm pursuing this department to have them provide services that would keep our community safe in ALL areas such as MCFN members, their well-being, their homes and personal property, local businesses and MCFN Organization buildings and property. I have another meeting scheduled this month to keep working on this project. I will keep the Nation updated as progress is made.

Service Canada: I have a meeting with Service Canada On Nov. 8. I have asked the Indigenous Affairs employees of Service Canada to frequently visit MCFN to provide plenty of opportunities for MCFN members/families to fill out forms in order to acquire such documents as: Passports, Birth Certificates, Social Insurance Numbers, Employment Insurance (EI), Canada Pension, Old Age Security Program. etc. By having Service Canada visit and set up here in the community, it will benefit members with limited or no transportation to acquire essential documents. I will also keep the Nation updated with dates and times when this project is confirmed.

Pillar 2, Nation Well-Being & Wellness: In September we met with the Indigenous Lead of Hamilton Public Health Services in regards to a project they are working on and requested MCFN to participate. We took this request and recommendation to Chief and Council and it was approved. Therefore the benefits of this project will improve the services that our MCFN members will receive who live in Hamilton, near Hamilton and those members in the future who may live in Hamilton or near Hamilton who access Hamilton Public Health.

Also in September I invited the CEO of Brant Health Care Systems and his team who are leading the Brantford General Health 5 year strategic plan. They came and met with us in order for MCFN to have valuable input and involvement in their strategic plan. Follow up meetings will be ongoing.

We also have met with and have built strong relationships through partnerships with institutions such as Jurvanski Cancer Care Centre, Hamilton MacMaster Children's Hospital, and West Haldimand General Hospital. I continue to have ongoing follow up discussions with these institutions and set meetings when required. I will also keep the Nation updated as progress is made.


On Monday October 28th, myself and the Pillar team was invited by the WHGH (Hagersville Hospital) Board of Directors for a Dinner and Discussion Meeting at the Hospital. We discussed ways of how the Hospital staff and services can better serve our MCFN members in a more respectful way where our culture and traditions are valued and acknowledged.

On Saturday September 28th, I gave a Pillar 2 presentation and update at the Monthly MCFN Community Gathering of what we've accomplished and what great strides we've made to date.



Commission Summary:

Generally, the Commission's objectives are to:

- Protect the health and safety of our members and others within MCFN's treaty lands and Territory and in particular, the health of children and young persons by restricting access and exposure to cannabis, edibles and extracts and other cannabis by-products;
- To protect the jurisdictional integrity of the treaty lands and Territory by ensuring mutual respect and cooperation with other governments in relation to the jurisdiction, economic advancement and enforcement of MCFN's laws
- To facilitate a regulated and controlled cannabis industry that will promote and enhance socioeconomic development, fiscal self-sufficiency and tangible benefits for the MCFN;
- Provide market advantages for the legal cultivation, processing, distribution, and retail sale of medical dispensary of quality controlled cannabis within and from MCFN's treaty lands and Territory;
- Deter illicit and illegal activities in relation to cannabis through appropriate sanctions and enforcement measures; and
- Balance the interests of MCFN's membership as it pertains to legal cannabis activity in MCFN's treaty lands and Territory.

The MCFN Cannabis Control Commission will be comprised of three (3) MCFN Band Members selected and appointed by the Government of the Mississaugas of the Credit. Terms of office will be staggered and no longer than three (3) years in length.

Eligibility Requirements

- Must be a MCFN Band Member:
- Must be nineteen (19) years of age or older;
- Must be willing and available to attend regular meetings within the MCFN community;
- Must not have a significant financial interest in a private entity that has applied for or has been granted a license in this Regulatory framework;
- Must not have a family member that resides with them that has any interest in a private entity that has applied for or has been granted a license in this Regulatory framework;
- Must not have any criminal convictions for an indictable offence, for which a pardon has not been granted.

Preference will be given to applicants that have experience with regulatory matters or who has a demonstrable history of serving on Commissions and/or Boards.
