- The Mississaugas for the New Credit Annual Three Fires Homecoming Pow Wow & Traditional Gathering will take place on Saturday, August 20th & Sunday, August 21st, 2022 with an entertainment night taking place on Friday, August 19th, 2022 from 5pm-10pm.
- > Vendors will have an opportunity to open their booth on Friday evening to serve the entertainment night attendees.
- Absolutely NO alcohol, drugs or people under the influence of alcohol/drugs will be tolerated or permitted on the property over the course of the weekend.
- No refunds. The Three Fires Homecoming Pow Wow & Traditional Gathering is not responsible for personal loss or injury, or for financial loss you may incur as a result of your participation in this event.
- > There will be absolutely no individual fundraising of any kind.
- Vendor booth payment is due upon submitting your completed package (send back page 2 & 3 of this application with payment).
- A vending space is approximately 10'x10' should your booth be larger than the specified size, please notify the Committee as soon as possible. <u>An extra fee will be charged</u>.
- All food vendors must provide a copy of a valid Safe Food Handler's Certificate to the New Credit Cultural Committee. Please note all helpers in your food booth must also provide a copy of their valid Safe Food Handlers certification as per MNCFN Council direction.
- > All vendors must provide a copy of his/her valid status card upon vendor package submission.
- > Please check in with the Vendor Coordinator at 2789 Mississauga Road, Hagersville, ON Building #2 upon arrival.
- > Vendor spots will be assigned and marked out to avoid conflict and promote efficient and productive set up.
- Set up is any time AFTER 1pm on the Friday, August 19th OR before 10AM on Saturday, August 20th 2022
- Craft Vendors: We kindly request that you donate an item for our Sunday giveaway. Donation items will be handed in upon arrival/set-up/during payment collection.
- There will be one grease bin on location for all food vendors to use to dispose of their used cooking oil. Used cooking oil does NOT get dumped onto the grass or into a regular garbage can. Failure to follow this request may result in discontinued future invitations.
- > This is a GREEN Event Food Vendors: please provide recyclable or compostable food containers/utensils/straws.
- Garbage dumpsters are for the Green Team waste diversion project. Please do not dispose of broken glass, lawn chairs, and canopies/booth supplies at the event.
- > All vehicles are to be out of the grounds by 10am Saturday Morning.
- All vendors are to park in the parking lot in front of the new Cultural office & Library located at 468 New Credit Road (around the corner from main entrance).

For your information:

- > The 2022 Pow Wow will be located at 2789 Mississauga Road (same location as previous years).
- Due to the limited spacing, once we reach capacity (40 craft vendors; 10 hydro equipped food vendors) no further vendors will be accepted.
- You are responsible to bring your own canopies, tables, chairs, etc.
- > All Pow Wow volunteers will be wearing a volunteer shirt and badge.
- Security will be present all weekend long.
- Please bring rain covers for your booth; we will not be relocating in the event of rain.
- > There will be ATM machines on site.
- Please bring your own feast bundles for food and water.

The Lloyd S. King Elementary School (LSK) community gathered for the first time since the pandemic started to celebrate students' success, resilience, and perseverance throughout the year.

Students, families, teachers, and staff from LSK held its annual Awards Ceremony to end the 2021-2022 school year on June 29 at the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation (MCFN) Community Centre.

Principal James Medway said he was very proud of all of the students for their efforts and understanding throughout the year. "I'm immensely proud," he said. "They have persevered... To look back at the school year and everything they've done and accomplished, it's amazing. It's certainly been a very unique year."

The ceremony began with a morning smudge, followed by a drum song and opening prayer.

Awards were presented to a boy and girl from each grade (Kindergarten to Gr. 8) for the four quadrants of the medicine wheel including, East – physical, which exemplifies strength and effort in sports, sportsmanship, physical education, and healthy living; The South – socio-emotional which exemplifies strength and effort in music, drama, dance, visual arts, and social interactions; the West – mental, which exemplifies strength and effort in overall academics; and the North, which exemplifies living a good life according to Anishinaabek teachings.

Councillor Kelly LaForme who attended the ceremony said he was glad the students and families could gather after so much time apart. "They have been through a lot," he said. "I'm happy for them and I wish them all the best."

INDIGENOUS PEOPLES DAY CELEBRATIONS





More than 100 community members gathered at the MCFN Social and Health Grounds on June 21 to mark the first Indigenous People's Day since COVID-19 restrictions kept communities apart.

Leslie Maracle, an organizer of the event, said it was nice to get the community back together after the event underwent a two-year hiatus during the height of the pandemic.

Fires were lit, and each community member was able to give a prayer and offer tobacco. Afterward they were able to roast a snack and enjoy tasting six different corn soups as part of the cook-off.

There was also a traditional dance tutorial with demonstrations and the stories behind where each dance came from.

The event ended with community members enjoying a traditional meal of fish, strawberries and maple syrup, salad, and strawberry juice.



The City of Mississauga hosted its inaugural National Indigenous Peoples Day (NIPD) event in collaboration with Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation (MCFN). The celebration, held at Mississauga Celebration Square, featured an official ceremony with remarks and greetings from City and Indigenous leaders, an artisan market, traditional foods and headline performances by MCFN talent: the Manitou Mkwa Singers, and MR. SAUGA.

"I want to say miigwech to the city of Mississauga for the opportunity to collaborate on this event," said Gimaa (Chief) Stacey Laforme, Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation. "Indigenous Peoples Day is a day for celebration and reflection. It was meaningful seeing the incredible Indigenous artists featured tonight, as art has a great responsibility to awaken the world. Art can and should change the world. That is why we were proud to play a part in this event."

Town of Oakville crosswalk



Town of Milton crosswalk

On June 13 the Town of Milton unveiled its orange crosswalk and on June 22 the Town of Oakville unveiled the first orange crosswalk in Town with MCFN

Carolyn King, founder of the Moccasin Identifier project told the crowd of more than 50 gathered at the unveiling in Oakville that the First Nation inclusion is an excellent step forward.

Oakville Mayor Rob Burton said they've committed to learning and to reconciliation.

"This orange crosswalk not only honours the children who never returned home from residential schools across Canada and the generational impact, trauma and oppression endured by Indigenous peoples in Canada as a result of the residential school system, but it also serves as a visual reminder of the important Truth and Reconciliation work that needs and must continue across Canada. The town remains committed to our Truth and Reconciliation efforts and an inclusive, diverse, and equitable Oakville," he said.

In a few months the crosswalk will also feature a utility cabinet wrapped in a Moccasin Identifier Project design to show the four moccasins that represent four linguistic groups in Ontario and a permanent interpretive sign.

King also said she was excited that the Moccasin Identifier project is "blowing up." "I have a dream," she said. "That the Moccasin Identifier is in every student's hand and in every school and that people never forget whose land they are on."

Milton's orange crosswalk is at Mill and Martin Streets, while Oakville's is downtown at Thomas and Church streets.

Indigenous Arts Fest at Fort York on June 18 and 19 drew more than 15,000 people to MCFN Treaty Lands.

The celebration included the Na-Me-Res (Native Men's Residence) Annual Traditional Pow Wow, led by Elder Gary Sault, with dancers from all over Ontario and the United States. There was also an Indigenous Artisan Market that ran all weekend, plus a stage where the Manitou Mkwa Singers performed on the final night.

"Today, we also reaffirm our commitment to advancing truth, justice and reconciliation, as well as working together with Indigenous community members and leaders to ensure Toronto is a place where Indigenous people can thrive," Toronto Mayor John Tory said.

REGION OF HALTON, GEORGE BROWN COLLEGE SIGN MOU'S WITH MCFN

Halton Region and the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation (MCFN) signed a Relationship Agreement, formalizing the ongoing work to build a constructive, collaborative and mutually respectful relationship.

"Building meaningful relationships with Indigenous Peoples, Communities and First Nations, including the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation—the Treaty Holders of the territory in which Halton Region sits—is an important part of Halton's responsibility for Truth and Reconciliation," said Halton Regional Chair Gary Carr. "Our journey of friendship and respect based on our treaty relations will give us the foundation to do good for all our people," said Gimaa Laforme.

A new partnership between George Brown College and the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation (MCFN) will bring important changes to campuses including a visible Indigenous presence through collaborative projects and new and progressive approaches to teaching, learning and curriculum while increasing support for Indigenous learners.

"I respect the work that is happening with George Brown College and signing a relationship agreement based on mutual respect and friendship will allow us to have a positive impact and will be mutually beneficial,"Gimaa Laforme said.

This event that brought elders, Gimaa Laforme, and an official Commonwealth delegation together in Waterdown was a collaboration between the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation, City of Hamilton, Rotary Club of Waterdown and Waterdown Lions Club, and Waterdown District High School's treaty studies class. The goal: to honour Waterdown's relationship with its treaty partner, the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation, by planting 70 trees at the Centre Road Park that now serves as a permanent monument and signage explaining the treaty territory Flamborough is a part of.

CERTIFICATE OF INDIAN STATUS CARDS (CIS)

- Status cards are issued by appointment only, every Thursday and Friday.
- We will issue status cards to members of other First Nations for an additional fee and with permission from their First Nation.
- Adults 16 years and older must provide 2 pieces of ID with one being a photo ID.
- Minors 15 years old and younger must have 1 piece of their own ID and 1 piece of parent/guardian photo ID.
- <u>NOTE</u>: Expired ID will not be accepted, with the exception of expired status cards on the condition the expiry date is no more than 6 months. We **DO NOT** accept photocopies of ID.
- <u>Acceptable ID</u>: birth certificate, health card, drivers licence, provincial photo ID card, Employee ID (with digitized photo), Student ID (with digitized photo), status card (cannot be expired for more than 6 months), firearms licence, Passport/Nexus card (counts as two pieces of ID)

<u>CERTIFICATE OF INDIAN STATUS (CIS) vs SECURE CERTIFICATE OF INDIAN</u> <u>STATUS CARDS (SCIS)</u>

- CIS cards are only issued by the First Nation (Beige with red strip)
- SCIS cards are only issued by Indigenous Services Canada (hard plastic, white card)
