Located in downtown Toronto at the University of Toronto, the St. Catherine Chapel is located within the traditional territory of the Mississaugas of the New Credit First Nation. This designation is a momentous occasion as prior to this designation, there were only two royal chapels located in Ontario. This is the third Royal Chapel designation to occur in Canada, and the first to be dedicated to the Mississaugas.

## April/May in Review: Message from Chief Stacey LaForme

Council is planning to hold a strategic planning session in the near future. Once Chief and Council have completed some preliminary work, we would like to update and involve the membership to chart a path forward. Too many times a different Chief and Council means a different direction, yet if we involve membership, if it has your stamp of approval, it becomes a guide for our future. A long journey we can set and ensure that future leadership respects.

Improving communication with our membership is a clear priority for Council. In January we began holding Monthly Gatherings for members and their families. These gatherings have been an excellent way for us, as a Council to connect with our membership. At each Monthly Gathering we have the opportunity to listen, share information, and chat over a good meal. We have also started sharing information through Facebook, Twitter, and YouTube to not only improve communication with our members across the world, but with other First Nations, Indigenous organizations, and anyone interested in learning more about our rich history and culture.

This month we are releasing the first issue of the redesigned Eaglepress Newsletter. This newsletter shares information on Council meetings and activities, departments, community initiatives, culture, history, and information for you, our membership. Please let us know what you think!

We are also building relationships with governments and First Nations organizations. At home we are working with the New Credit Cultural Committee who met with Regular Council in April to discuss the MNCFN Pow wow and traditional gathering. The meeting was a very positive step forward and we look forward to discussing the possible future relocation of the Pow wow at an upcoming MNCFN Monthly Gathering.



The Pan Am Games brought tremendous exposure to MNCFN throughout our traditional territory, we are continuing on with this exposure taking every opportunity to ensure everyone knows and respects the lands of the Mississaugas. We were the host First Nation for the Little NHL and the National Aboriginal Hockey Championships, both of which were held in the city of Mississauga.

We are contacted on a daily basis for input and involvement in various events and initiatives. Some of these events are very large in scale such as the 2017 Invictus Games in Toronto, for which we are the Host First Nation, and the World Expo 2025 bid.

An MNCFN Major Events Committee was established in April to determine and implement our involvement in such events. This committee will report to Council

on a regular basis. Although most issues at this committee to date have been athletic events, we anticipate that this will evolve to include many different areas such as Health, Social and Education.

To assist with the great demand for our time and information about the Mississaugas of the Credit we have developed a Communication department that has a Director, a writer and a Culture and Events Coordinator. The Culture and Events Coordinator

has been busy establishing a pool of resources for this First Nation; such as elders, cultural practitioners, and people who have special skills that can benefit the Nation at various events.


The energizing of the Mississaugas Nation is not only a much needed political alliance, it is a social responsibility. Council met with the other five Mississaugas Nations at Hiawatha for a two day meeting and Grand entry at the Hiawatha Pow wow. We expect to move closer to a

formal relationship among the Mississaugas where we work together on common challenges. All Nations have approved a contact to coordinate an elders/youth summit to discuss the history of the Mississaugas Nation. We are coordinating a leadership team of economic development people from each First Nation to look at joint financial wealth opportunities for the Nation. We will be advertising for a Nationhood symbol/logo in each of the Nations.

The Human Rights challenge that MNCFN has against the Federal Government regarding the inequity of services related to High Cost Special Needs on and off-reserve was scheduled to begin at the tribunal level this month. Chief and Council along with legal have determined that we are

going to postpone the tribunal level because of the positive steps shown by the Government in regards to settlement of the complaint.

We are actively engaged with many potential economic partners and are anticipating a wealth creation forum/strategy session that will set a strategic direction for wealth creation. The creation of wealth is a small part of our overall agenda for moving this



First Nation forward but it is an important part.

The Mississaugas of the New Credit Chief and Council are unified and dedicated to the future of this First Nation.

## **Teachings From** Our Elders....

"... It's the time of year when the spring time is coming to us; it's part of our past. We know this moon as the omakakii-yiizis – He who buries himself in the earth. The frog. This is the creatures that [we all] associate with spring when we hear their sounds. In the Anishinaabe world, they're very important to us just as the thunderbirds. The thunderbirds play an important part [in the lives of Anishinaabe people] as when the thunderbirds come from the south to the north, the earth begins to shake because of their song. And when they do that the earth shakes, and this mixes up Mginikik, and he comes out and he sings, he sings a beautiful song so he can call a mate. It's beautiful to listen to them because it's like a choir - one will start here, another will start in another part of the bush and pretty soon they are all together singing the same song... We as anishinaabe people should take a lesson from the frogs and sing the same song all together so it will be a beautiful thing to listen to."

## Mississaugas of the New Credit First Nation Historical Tidbit:

The Chippewa Union School located on the S ½ of Lot 2 Con 1 of Oneida Township on MNCFN territory serviced the children of New Credit and the nearby families of Walpole Township. Superintendent of Indian Affairs Gilkison reported, in a letter of 12 March 1873 to Ottawa, on the attendance at the school between July and December of 1872. 55 students were to attend the school for the 104 instructional days contained within the time period. Gilkison reported that the average rate of attendance at the school was about 26%. Some students attended as few as 5 days during the period while others had perfect atten-

dance. Perfect attendance was achieved by two New Credit students -9 year old Lochlan Herkimer for the boys and 9 year old Annie McDougall for the girls.

The school was eventually closed and the building relocated. Many community members will remember the old school as the old white clapboard structure that functioned as the concession stand near the present ball diamond.



## In Council... Infrastructure & Development



The following are highlights of the April 4th, 2016 MNCFN Infrastructure and Development Council meeting. For full details, please see the minutes which are available 4-5 weeks after each meeting at www.newcreditfirstnation.com

#### Flooding Summary

Six Nations Environmental Technician and former MNCFN Council Member, Clynt King, presented to Council about a project that will help identify watershed and remediation within our community in efforts to reduce the effects of climate change and flooding. A joint project between Six Nations of the Grand River and the MNCFN, named the Boston Creek Master Drainage and Flood Remediation, will be included in the final phase of the project. More updates will be provided as the project unfolds.

#### **Union of Ontario Indians**

Grand Council Chief Patrick Madahbee and Deputy Chief Glen Hare provided an overview of the Union of Ontario Indians (UOI) of which the Mississaugas of the New Credit First Nation are not a member. The UOI is composed for 40 First Nations across Ontario and has its head office in Nipissing.

#### Secure Certificates of Indian Status

The Acting Director of Lands, Membership and Research informed Chief and Council that some seniors are having difficulty renewing their new Certificate of Indian Status Cards. When renewing these cards a band member has to submit two passport pictures and other documentation if necessary such as marriage certificates. This is difficult for seniors as this renewal process has to take place at the Indian Affairs Office in Brantford. Once a band member has obtained this new card, they cannot revert back to the orange laminated cards. It was also pointed out that when a senior passes away a status card is required to apply for the Estate Policy.

The resulting motion (#5) was passed: "That the MNCFN Infrastructure and Development Council agrees to have the Chief send a letter to Mr. Goodale, Minister of Public Safety and Indigenous & Northern Affairs Canada informing them the process for obtaining/renewing the new Secure Certificates of Indian Status is not acceptable as it creates a hardship on Elderly and Disabled Band Members. And further, Chief LaForme will bring this issue to the attention of the Assemby of First Nations and Minister of Indigenous and Northern Affairs Canada.

#### **Animal Control**

Lands, Membership and Research has been working on an Animal Control solution for MNCFN so that community members have someone to call when they see animals acting strangely. This issue is of key concern because of the current increased risk of rabies on MNCFN. A contract for animal control has been issued with no response.

The resulting motion (#6) was passed: "That the MNCFN Infrastructure & Development Council directs LRM Department to continue to meet with Six Nations to investigate the possibility of retaining Six Nations Animal Control Officers and/or investigate other alternatives on a Service Agreement."

#### Townline Estates Beautification Project

The following motion (#7) was passed: "That the MNCFN Infrastructure & Development Council approves the Executive Director to sign the Playground Construction Agreement pertaining to Beautification of Townline Estates, Phase 1 – total cost up to \$198,273.59. Dollars will come from the Enterprise Fund.

## Aboriginal Children and Youth Strategy

The Honourable Tracy MacCharles, Minister of Children and Youth Services sent a letter to Chief LaForme in March requesting that MNCFN formally join "the leadership and technical processes" of the Aboriginal Children and Youth Strategy. The provincial Ministry states that the "strategy will focus on building community-driven, integrated and culturally appropriate supports to help Aboriginal children and young people grow up healthy and reach their full potential." Chief and Council requested information on a possible upcoming meeting on the issue.

## Mississaugas Nation Gathering at Hiawatha First Nation

Chief Cowie, of Hiawatha First Nation invited the other 5 Mississaugas Nations to Hiawatha for a political gathering on May 19th and 20th followed by a Pow wow on May 21st and 22nd. Chief Cowie also suggested some agenda items for the gathering and welcomed drums, eagle staffs, and flags from each First Nation.

MNCFN Chief and Council reviewed previous discussions and noted that this is the 3rd such meeting with the last being held at Mississaugi 8. It was noted that the Nations should not lose focus on common issues such as MRP, Education, Health etc. The possibility of preparing a presentation for the gathering was also discussed as was the importance of learning more about the other Mississaugas Nations.



#### High Speed Rail

The Government of Ontario is investigating the potential for a High Speed Rail transportation corridor from Toronto to Windsor. The Honourable David Collenette is the special advisor to the Government of Ontario on the project and is responsible for building a business case, identifying potential financing and initial consultation.

The MNCFN Department of Consultation and Accommodation (DOCA) hired an independent consultant to identify potential areas of opportunity for the MNCFN and produced a report. DOCA Director Mark LaForme recommended a presentation to Mr. Collenette and the following motion was passed:

"That the MNCFN Education & Social Services Council agrees to a special meeting with Chief and Council and Mr. Collenette on April 27, 2016 to provide the opportunity for MNCFN to present and provide Mr. Collenette with the consultation and engagement expectations of the MNCFN regarding the proposed Toronto-to-Windsor High Speed Rail Project."

#### Major Events Committee

The Aboriginal Leadership Partners (ALP), a group of representatives from various

Indigenous groups that was formed for the Pan Am Games, met in Toronto on March 24th, 2016. The ALP intends to continue in a long-term format to work with major event organizers in the Greater Toronto Area. The Media and Communications Director identified a need for

MNCFN to take a lead role in the rein-

vention of the ALP and further noted that there is a need to establish clear direction on MNCFN involvement in major events within MNCFN's traditional territory. The establishment of a Major Events Committee was recommended and approved with a budget of \$13,000 to be funded through the Enterprise Fund. More information on the Major Events Committee is available on page 13.

#### Honorariums

The need for consistent honorariums was discussed and the following motion was passed: "That the MNCFN Education and Social Services Council approves that honorarium for all meetings ie. New Credit Representatives on various outside committees such as the Heritage Mississauga Rep, Elders and Youth, the Drum Group etc. will be \$150.00 (One Hundred Fifty Dollars) right across the board effective Monday, April 11, 2016."

#### Spring Clean-up

Funding for the annual MNCFN Spring Clean-up was requested by the acting director of Lands, Research and Membership. \$2000 was requested to be transferred from Special Event Funding for delivery, pick up, and emptying of bins; and to purchase gloves, garbage bags, and bottled

water for members participating in roadside clean



Donation of Sports Equipment from the Ministry of Tourism, Culture and Sport. This equipment was later forwarded to Attawapiskat Youth as decided in Regular Council.

## Regular Council

#### Regular Council April 18th

The following are highlights of the April 18th, 2016 MNCFN Regular Council meeting. For full details, please see the minutes which are available 4-5 weeks after each meeting at www.newcreditfirstnation.com

#### Police Incident Report

Fourteen incidences were reported for the month of March, 2016. This is down from 30 incidences in 2015 and 22, in 2014. The Ministry of Transportation has delayed development of the lights at Hwy 6 and Mississauga Rd. for unknown reasons which will be investigated.

#### **MNCFN Pow wow Committee**

The New Credit Cultural Committee was invited to Regular Council to discuss the Mississaugas of the New Credit 30th Pow wow and Traditional Gathering. The cultural committee expressed their frustration with their relationship with Chief and Council since being removed from Council 30 years ago. The committee relayed the difficulties they face raising funds for the Pow wow each year and noted the dilapidated state of the pow wow structures.

MNCFN Chief and Council emphasized that this is a new Council that is eager to discuss the issues facing the pow wow and work together while having "open and honest dialogue". The cultural committee was also recognized as being "integral to this community".

The Cultural Committee Chair requested the Pow wow discussion be brought to the membership at a monthly gathering. Chief and Council agreed and assigned the Media and Communications department to work with the cultural committee on a presentation for the May 2016 Monthly Gathering to gather input from the membership on the possible relocation of the pow wow to the grounds of the former Green Willow. In the interim, the Director of Sustainable Economic Development was asked to take the cultural committee on a tour on the Green Willow grounds.

#### **Strategic Planning Session**

Councillor Margaret Sault identified a need to set goals and develop a long term plan regarding governance and public accountability. Councillor M. Sault noted that since orientation in January, Council has been in "reaction mode" dealing with issues stemming from the previous council and there is no clear vision or direction for the community regarding governance. The recommendation was made and passed to direct the Executive Director or her designate to obtain 3 quotes from consultants to assist in the development of a strategic planning process.

#### Roof Repairs on Industrial Building

MNCFN Regular Council approved up to \$5000 for repairs to Industrial Building roof over Wingers with funds coming from TO Purchase Community Development Fund.

#### Chief and Council Plaques for the Community Centre

Councillor Erma Ferrell explained that plaques have been purchased and are to be placed in the

Community Centre. Pictures of the Chiefs were purchased and framed to hang above their plaques. Currently only nineteen of the thirty three Chiefs were located, re-photographed and framed. Place holders in the form of frames are needed to secure a spot for future location and/or purchase of the fourteen remaining Chiefs. A budget of \$1000 was approved to cover the cost 14 frames prepared for hanging and 14 pictures from the Toronto Library.

#### Executive Finance Council – April 25th

#### Community Centre Upgrades

The Media and Communications Director brought forward recommendations and a budget for upgrades to the MNCFN Community Centre. The upgrades included a podium and kitchen equipment. A direction was given to work with Public Works and the Infrastructure Maintenance Worker to determine a finalized cost of the upgrades, and further, that the upgrades would occur under the Public Works Department who is responsible for the Community Centre.

#### Presentation on XTM

Marilyn Shaffer of XTM presented to Chief and Council on the Pan Am "You Are Welcome" campaign. The campaign was presented as a success with \$49m dollars of "earned media" from the \$1.39m investment made by MNCFN. The food truck was particularly successful and was listed as the #2 best surprise of Pan Am as reported by the Toronto Star.

Ms. Shaffer clarified that XTM has never been part of Paymobile but worked on the promotion of the Paymobile cards. These mastercards are still available for purchase and may be reloaded through the youarewelcome2015.com website. XTM's contract with MNCFN ended in August 2015 but there are opportunities for the "You Are Welcome" campaign to continue.

#### **Eaglepress Redesign**

The Media & Communications Department proposed a redesigned Eaglepress newsletter that incorporates the social and health services newsletter. Council instructed the Media and Communications director to provide further details on costs including postage and 3 printing quotes.

#### Employee Morale/Employee Recognition Program

Direction was given previously for Councillor Casey Jonathan to meet with the Human Resource Manager to bring back ideas on ways to build employee morale within the MNCFN. The parties met twice and discussed both short and long-term goals. The recommendations brought forward at this time focus on immediate items and could be easily implemented and provide immediate positive impact. An outline for the Employee Recognition Program and budget was recommended.

## Purpose of the Community Gatherings...

Chief and Council brought forward communication as a priority immediately following elections. The possibility of regular community meetings was raised and, after some consultation with the membership, soon came to fruition with the MNCFN Monthly Gatherings.

The MNCFN Monthly Gatherings are an opportunity for the membership to engage with Chief and Council in meaningful dialogue. It is a chance for Council and departments to share information on current and upcoming activities and gather input from the membership.

The MNCFN Monthly Gatherings are usually held on the 4th Saturday of each month at 10:00am at the MNCFN Community Centre. A hot lunch is provided and Chief and Council are available to discuss issues with members on a one-on-one basis. The topics of the presentations are determined by Chief and Council based on recommendations from the membership and departments. If there is a topic that you would like discussed at an upcoming monthly gathering please contact a member of council or the Media & Communications Director at 905 768-**5**858.

## April Monthly Gatherings...

There were two Monthly Gathering meetings that took place during the month of April to account for Easter Weekend holiday in March. Both meetings covered the Toronto Purchase Trust (TPT) and took place on April 2nd and April 23rd. Georgina Villeneuve and Jeff Frketich from Peace Hills Trust were in attendance during both meetings to present financial updates of the Trust investments. Kim Fullerton was in attendance during the April 2nd meeting to provide information regarding the legalities of the investment process and the operations of the Toronto Purchase Trust.

During the April 2nd meeting, members from Peace Hills Trust provided an informative presentation on how the TPT

works, how investments are made and provided comprehensive update by reviewing the Fiscal Year 2015 Annual Report of the Trustees. An important take away from the meeting was the need for an investment policy.

Jeff Frketich stressed the importance of developing an investment policy by reviewing the function of Council, financial advisors and the Trustee. The investment policy can be considered a "road map" that describes the financial goals and objectives of the Trust and guides the investment process in achieving these goals. Overall the investment policy defines the role and responsibilities of the Trustees and investment managers and controls the risk associated with the investment.

Kim Fullerton also presented during the April 2nd meeting and provided information regarding the operation of the Trust as legal counsel to the Mississaugas

of the New Credit First Nation. Throughout his presentation he addressed questions from MNCFN band members regarding logistics of the Trust and past dealings. Questions regarding the Community Wellness payments and unclaimed TPT disbursement were addressed in detail with full explanations of financial procedures. Mr. Fullerton also addressed the discontinuation of Mackie Research as the appointed Corporate Trustee and explained the factors involved in the decision to terminate.

Ideas for possible use of TPT funds during the upcoming fiscal were documented during the April 2nd meeting and included input from the community members in attendance. Ideas for the use of the funds were waterline project completion, recognition of ancestors, aftercare programs and what can be done, pension plans for the whole membership and moving or replicating the Lloyd S. King mural for easy access. These ideas will be reviewed by Council and feasibility will be determined at a later date.

Peace Hills Trust members provided an overview of the current status of the Trust and reviewed the Annual Report of the Trustee during the second meeting held on April 23rd. The health of investments and the Trust were focused on and described in detail. Updates regarding specific investments were provided, including an update regarding the WeedMD investment. Richard Beatty from MNP was also in attendance to present and provided a review of financial statements and an audit report. Mr. Beatty explained the approval process of the statements and the role of the Trustee in this approval. Calculations and overview of income payouts, investment returns, investment management fees, changes in cash resources, and accounting policies were provided.

is chaired by Councillor Evan Sault, and includes as its members Councillor Veronica King-Jamieson, the Directors of Media and Communications and Sustainable Economic Development, and MNCFN members Katelyn LaForme and Pat Mandy. The Media and Communications Department serves as the administrative lead for the MEC.

Councillor Evan Sault says the Major Events Committee is "important because MNCFN wants to be involved from the very early stages of Major Events taking place within our traditional territory. We want to be recognized as Host First Nation through positive messages and ensure our culture and traditions are exemplified."

Initial projects of the Major Events Committee include:

## Reinvention of the Aboriginal Leadership Pavilion

Members of the Aboriginal Leadership Partnership (ALP), a group that was established for the Pan Am Games, met in March at the Ministry of Tourism, Culture and Sport. The group discussed the possibility of continuing the partnership for the long term. The

Major Events Committee anticipates a leadership role in this group with a MNCFN representative as chair. MNCFN will be making recommendations to the group for a new Terms of Reference that is inclusive of all recognized Indigenous organizations and First Nations that have interests in the Greater Toronto Area.

#### 2017 Invictus Games

The Mississaugas of the New Credit First Nation are the Host First Nation of the 2017 Invictus Games. The Games will be held in Toronto in September 2017. The Major Events Committee is working with Invictus Toronto organizers to examine opportunities for MNCFN involvement. Invictus representatives have visited MNCFN twice to meet first with Chief LaForme and Councillor Evan Sault, then again to present to full Chief and Council.

#### World Expo 2025

The City of Toronto is considering preparing a bid for the World Expo 2025 and has reached out to MNCFN for early involvement in the project. The Major Events Committee will be in contact with the organizers in early May.

## Haldimand Emergency Services Provides Fire Safety Learning Through Pilot Program with ECC

On April 13th and 14th, Sparky the Fire Dog and members of the Haldimand County Emergency Services paid a special two-day visit to the Ewaamjigenang Children's Centre. The educational visit was a part of a pilot program that aims to bring fire safety to early childhood education.

During the two-day visit, fire-fighters were on site for children to view the fire truck, learn about emergency service equipment and to help children try on protective fire gear. Sparky the Fire Dog was also on site to greet children and to hand out promotional items. Each child received a colouring book, crayons and a Haldimand County Emergency

Services hat. Four firefighters, along with Assistant Captain Richard Geredink, volunteered their time to be a part of the educational program – some of which changed shifts specifically to attend the event.

The program focused on basic fire safety and aimed to familiarize children with emergency service providers. It has been widely reported that a common reaction during an emergency situation for children under 5 years of age is to hide in closets, under beds or in corners - all of which may prevent rescue. Through familiarizing children with emergency service providers and teaching basic fire safety, children will be able to better protect themselves during an emergency situation and will be less likely to engage in firesetting behavior.

The children and Ekwaamjigenang Children's Centre staff were thrilled with the program and look forward to continuing fire safety learning. ECC Supevisor Patti Barber and Elisa Machida, Assistant Supervisor, have been asked to provide feedback on the program to assist in the development of a fire safety program appropriate for early childhood learning.

Machida explained how excited students were for the visit and claimed many were still talking about the experience weeks after. Machida expressed her gratitude for the visit and looks forward to further involvement with Haldimand County Emergency Services, "We are very grateful for this visit and look forward to their return in June."

## Making First Nations Housing a Priority: **New Housing Funding Increase**



As of April 2016, New Construction Housing applicants will be able to access an allotment of \$150,000.00, compared to the past amount of \$110,000.00. This increase will be provided from the Housing Reserve Fund and will be in addition to an expected funding increase provided by the Federal Government. The Trudeau Government has pledged \$8.4 million over five years to improve the socio-economic conditions within Indigenous communities. From the total that has been pledged in the 2016 Federal Budget, \$739 million has been dedicates specifically to First Nations Housing to address the dire housing conditions and issues such as overcrowding, structural deficiencies and lack of adequate and affordable housing.

This increase for Mississaugas of the New Credit First Nation Housing Program was approved by Council in March of 2016, and will provide access to extra funds for new builds that will account for the rising rates of building materials. With the average home costing approximately \$150 per square foot, this increase will provide funds more suited to housing prices for 2016.

### LANDS, RESEARCH & MEMBERSHIP

## Hunter and Anglers Community Meeting

On May 18th, the Lands, Research, and Membership Department held a hunting and fishing meeting to share information with local hunters. The majority of attendees were local hunters who engage in hunting activities both on and off-reserve.

Some community members brought forward concerns for Council's attention. Some of the issues were the use of high powered rifles; use of ATV's (or other motorized vehicles) across personal property and farm lands; use of hounds; public safety; hunting out of season; and fair play and sportsmanship.

Some of the hunters also emphasized the need to feed their families and exercise their treaty rights. Other items discussed were the fact that high powered rifles are often used because they're considered more humane, and the usage of ATV's to transport animals. The limited hunting area was also raised as an issue. It was suggested that MNCFN should explore the possibility of expanding our hunting area.

Mississaugas of the New Credit First Nation has a by-law in place regarding high powered rifles. By-law No. 6 dated November 20, 1961, states, "... No person shall hunt with or shoot on Reserve at any time with a rifle larger than a 22 caliber, regardless of whether such person may be licensed to use a high powered rifle off the Reserve or not but a person may hunt with or shoot with a shot-gun on the Reserve."

Jeff Columbus, Ministry of Natural Resources, advised that for the Southwestern Ontario hunting area, the legal caliber of rifle is 22 up to a maximum of 270. Northern Ontario hunters can use a high caliber (330+) due to larger game and more secluded areas.

Mr. Columbus also mentioned that according to a Supreme Court Case ruling, First Nation members

are allowed to stay longer on some northerly crown lands and erect a "Sundowner Cabin" if the hunting trip is for longer periods of time.

Michelle Schaefer, O.P.P. liaison officer, was also present and advised that the O.P.P. will respond to requests from landowners about trespassers on their land.

As a result of the feedback from the hunters and some concerned band members, the following suggestions were made:

- Develop an educational tool that can be used to inform the public as well as other hunters;
- Conduct family visits to educate about proper hunting protocol;
- Rescind By-law No. 6;
- Non-members hunting on New Credit Territory be required to hunt with an MNCFN Band member;
- Protection from outside authorities coming on FN territory to confiscate game;
- Investigate possibility of creating our own hunting education course;
- Create a committee to oversee the above project.

A follow-up meeting will be held in the MNCFN Council Chambers on Tuesday, June 14th at 6:00pm



### CONSULTATION & ACCOMMODATION

## Department of Consultation & Accommodation: Overview

The Department of Consultation and Accommodation (DOCA) was established to proactively address the Crown's Duty to Consult. This is in response to the Supreme Court of Canada's decision relating to the Crown's Duty to Consult with Aboriginal communities regarding proposed land development when their treaty and traditional lands are impacted.

DOCA's mandate is to engage with governments and private sector proponents on land and resource matters that may impact the interests of our First Nation. DOCA will assess and help alleviate impacts on our rights, land claims, and ways of life by building relationships, and where possible, partnerships with governments and private sector proponents.

DOCA also works to advance negotiations with major proponents for securing capacity funding for project reviews, long-term relationship agreements to provide annual funding for community initiatives, and revenue sharing on major projects.

Updates on DOCA projects will be provided at the Monthly Gathering on June 25th.

#### High Speed Rail

The Honourable David Collenette, High Speed Rail Special Advisor, was tasked with delivering a final report to the Province of Ontario in the fall of 2016 on the economic potential, international best practices, financial options and a preliminary business case for High Speed Rail (HSR).

As part of the special advisor's mandate, Mr. Collenette must engage with First Nations and other stakeholders. A constructive and meaningful first engagement session occurred between Mr. Collenette, Ministry of Transportation officials, and MNCFN Chief and Council on April 27th, 2016.

MNCFN Chief and Council agreed in principal

with the Province's three broad starting objectives for considering high speed rail:

- To transform mobility choice, and provide efficient and sustainable mobility, in Southwestern Ontario;
- To catalyze municipal and regional economic development by connecting innovation hubs, knowledge and industry centres;
- To support integration and development at the municipal, regional and corridor levels. MNCFN provided preliminary feedback via written submission which included a recommendation to add 3 cornerstone objectives to these high-level statements of principle:
- To meaningfully engage the First Nations in a genuine nation-to-nation process in the planning, development and implementation of High Speed Rail;
- To ensure First Nation communities are enabled to share in the job creation, skills upgrading, and business and economic development opportunities generated by High Speed Rail; and
- To protect our natural environment and honour Canada's international commitments to reduce the impacts of climate change.

The submission also made clear that MNCFN expects "the Special Advisor and Province of Ontario will consider the MNCFN as a trusted, valued engagement partner, beginning today and through every stage of planning, design and implementation for such a "quantum-leap" project that could potentially transform how we live, move, work, manage growth and co-exist with our natural environment – within our Traditional Territory known today as Southwestern Ontario.

## Media & Communications Department: Overview



The Media and Communications Department was established in June, 2015 and is responsible for:

- Facilitating meaningful dialogue between Chief and Council and the MNCFN membership;



#### Protect Your Family Against Rabies...

## Be Aware and Stay Safe!

In December of 2015, four dead raccoons had tested positive for rabies in Hamilton Ontario and sparked a province wide advisory. As of March 28th, there have been 70 reported cases in the surrounding areas incorporating Hamilton and Haldimand County. Although rabies awareness is common and many pet owners religiously vaccinate pets against the disease, it still comes as a shock for the disease to hit so close to home.

With warmer weather fast approaching, it is important to be aware of how to protect yourself, your family and your animals against this disease. Rabies can be easily transmitted from an infected animal through the exchange of blood or saliva, and very rarely through breathing in the escaping gases from decomposing animal carcasses. If you own pets or livestock, it is important to have these animals vaccinated against rabies for the safety of the animal and your family.

Common symptoms of rabies to watch for are:

- Inability to swallow
- Excessive salivation; frothy saliva
- Pica (Eating non-edible/food items)

- Constant irritability/changes in attitude/behavior
- Seizures
- Fever
- Muscular lack of coordinator
- Paralysis
- Unusual shyness or aggression
- Hydrophobia (Fear of water)
- Excessive excitability
- Change in tone of bark
- Paralysis in the jaw and larynx

If you observe a raccoon, skunk or any other animal that is acting strange and exhibiting any of the above symptoms - do not approach it. If you or a family member has been scratched or bitten by an animal acting strangely or exhibiting symptoms of rabies, you should report it to your local health authority immediately for further investigation.

MNCFN is currently working on a process for animal control services; in the meantime you may contact (905)768-0100 or (905)768-0141 for more information regarding the appropriate animal control for our region or to report a bite or scratch.


## New Credit Variety & Gas Bar: Make A Purchase, Give Back to Your Community

## ACEP Aims to Address Environmental Concerns & Climbing Hydro Rates

Aboriginal communities across Ontario have engaged in the Aboriginal Community Energy Plan (ACEP) program with the help of the Aboriginal Energy Partnerships Program. With ever increasing hydro rates, a greater need for energy savings and an increased awareness of the environment, the ACEP has introduced innovative solutions for Aboriginal communities to combat these isses.

Through the ACEP, Aboriginal communities are funding up to \$90,000, to identify and address the unique energy needs of their communities. Through ACEP funding, communities are able to develop a comprehensive plan to ensure energy savings andstewardship of the environment within their community. Additionally, this program has provided

economic and employment opportunities.

MNCFN was one of nine new communities to be approved for this program in November of 2015. Following approval, the ACEP will begin with a comprehensive analysis of what energy needs are required within the community through direct consultation with MNCFN community members.


Joanne Bidini, Founder of the Harmony Collaboration, explains the concept of the project, "Our project as a whole represents an opportunity to learn about and embrace Indigenous culture by connecting people through creating and experiencing art and music together."

Joanne further explained the social impacts that the project hopes to promote, "What's really obvious to me is that most other cultures that make up the so-called Canadian mosaic share values inherent in the First Nations' stewardship of the Earth... Working with this in my mind, Harmony is expressing humanity's similarities and not just our differences."

MNCFN member and Councillor, Cathie Jamieson, has joined the project to aid in recruiting traditional dancers from the community to bring the mural to life. Cathie expressed her pride in representing the community and helping with the project, "My involvement is based on artistic value; I don't want to lead or change. I want to promote energy throughout our community to be expressive and to take a lead in promoting our culture."

In addition to the stage production, the Harmony Collaboration also plans to host a travelling exhibition of the charcoal sketches that were the initial concepts of the mural design. These sketches would allow for the teachings of the mural to travel to other communities and would provide an opportunity to learn about Indigenous culture. The travelling exhibition would also promote the initial concept of the Harmony Collaboration - To celebrate in the commonalities that all cultures share.

#### **Biodiversity Program Connects MNCFN**

## **Elders To Anishinaabe Roots**

Since the creation of the NC Biodiversity Team in the summer of 2014, the group has been engaged in many projects within the MNCFN community. The group was formed through the Life of the Grove project, and has hosted a variety of workshops and programs to promote biodiversity learning within the MNCFN community since its inception.

Biodiversity refers to the diverse ecosystems of plants and animals and explains their connection to air, water, land, and fire. Through engaging in biodiversity initiatives, MNCFN members will be given an opportunity to learn about their role in helping the earth as Anishnaabe people. For this reason, Biodversity Coordinator, Carla Campbell, has developed programming to engage community members of all ages. Programs have been held for Ekwaamjigenang Children's Centre, Lloyd S. King Elementary and, most recently, for the elders of our community.

During a Home and Community Care luncheon in March of 2015, Carla Campbell paid a visit to the MNCFN Seniors Group to determine biodiversity interests. From this meeting the group identified that they would be interested in learning more about birds, fish and medicinal plants.

Through the Ontario Seniors Community Grant Program and a partnership with Home and Community Care, the NC Biodiversity Team was able to provide a biodiversity program for our Elders. Educational activities were planned for the Normandale Fish Hatchery and the Terra Cotta Conservation Area, located in our traditional territory. The program also included a presentation by archaeobotanist, R.D. Fecteau, on the history, usage and location of medicinal plants.

Through this grant, elders were also given bird houses, seeds, gardening tools, a small collection of literature, and planters to encourage further learning and participation. Ojibway language teacher, James Shawana, was also consulted to incorporate language and cultural learning into the program.

The program concluded with a final presentation during the February senior's luncheon that featured a culminating slideshow and discussion. Feedback was also gathered at this time and determined the focus of the next program will be on butterflies, bees and invasive plants.

Due to the overwhelming positive feedback, the NC Biodiversity Team plans to continue the Elders Program and has submitted a 2016 grant application. Carla explained the importance of the program for our elders, "It's been great to see them share their knowledge. They learn from the sessions and are given an opportunity to teach and share the information they have with each other and the community."


