It was also a result of the relationships we built with Massey college, and with the chapel Royal at Massey, and the relationship between the chapel here and in England.

I believed this would raise the profile of the michii saugii and perhaps move our communities a little bit toward some type of governance structure for the nation.

The visit with the crown was nice and a bit historic as the Mississaugas had not officially visited since 1860 and was reflective on the treaty of Niagara. However the valuable relationships we made will lead to many opportunities.

I also believe we need to have an ambassador in the UK and discussions on trade agreements. Challenging things, but not insurmountable if you build the correct relationship.

Also wanted to express my gratitude to the First Nation for placing their trust and faith in me for the past eight years as Gimaa (chief) and let membership know I will not be seeking re-election in December.

The MCFN Special Events Deparatment held it's second Annual Birch Bark Canoe Build lead by Darren Lentz from Thunder Bay, Regan Bolduc and Mark Sault, at the Harvest Grounds from July 2 to 10. Many community members were able to take part in every aspect of the creation of two birch bark canoes including preparing the bark for the frame, securing it to the frame, cutting pieces for the inner framing, making lashing from birch bark, soaking and wrapping it on to the canoe.

Community members were also part of etching designs into the canoes to give them unique community flare.

MCFN youth day camps, daycare students, land camp participants and more were able to visit and learn more about their culture and heritage.

The canoes were launched onto Mackenzie Creek on July 10 and many community members were given the opportunity to take them for a spin.

Delegation from the Michi Saagiig Nishnaabeg Nation meets King Charles III

First meeting between the Mississauga Nation and the Sovereign since 1860

The first delegation in over 160 years from the Michi Saagiig Nishnaabeg Nation (Mississauga Nation) had a meeting with His Majesty King Charles III during a Garden Party held at Holyroodhouse Place in Edinburgh, Scotland.

At the King's direction, the delegation was the first to be presented to His Majesty during the annual garden party held at the Scottish palace. The meeting lasted for approximately 15 minutes as the King discussed Treaty, the wildfires in Canada, as well as other topics of importance to the delegation. During the meeting the King was shown a replica of The **Covenant Chain Wampum (Treaty** of Niagara Belt) by Gimaa R. Stacey Laforme, which was the official gift to His Majesty by the delegation. This historic meeting was arranged through His Majesty's Chapels Royal, a family of chapels that includes The King's Anishinabek Sacred Place (Chapel Royal) located at Massey College in Toronto, Ontario. Created by Queen Elizabeth II in 2017, the Chapel Royal at Massey College is rooted in the Treaty of Niagara and Silver Covenant Chain (a relationship between Indigenous Peoples and the Sovereign that dates back to the reign of King Charles II). The





MCFN Gimaa Stacey Laforme was part of the delegation to the United Kingdom to meet King Charles III.

Covenant Chain Wampum (Treaty of Niagara Belt) gifted by the delegation to the King was one of the key belts used to bring the Mississauga Nation into a Treaty relationship with the Sovereign (then King George III) in 1764.

The Covenant Chain remains the foundational Treaty of what would become Canada. This was the first

meeting of a delegation from the Michi Saagiig Nishnaabeg Nation (Mississauga Nation) and the Sovereign since Nahneebahwequa (Catherine Sutton) met with Queen Victoria at Buckingham Palace on June 19th, 1860.

This was the first meeting between Giimag (Chiefs) from the... Continued on page 10...

This historic meeting was part of a larger diplomatic mission by the Michi Saagiig Nishnaabeg Nation (Mississauga Nation) that included visits to St. James's Palace, Government of the Isle of Man (including

From the Post-Secondary desk...

Here it is, July, edging toward August. You can still apply for a September start, although many programs are filled up at colleges and universities by now. Many of those same schools have January start dates. We are still accepting applications at this time, so you can still try.

Just head to the MCFN website, and under the Lifelong Learning tab you can find the online application. You will also need to fill out the paper application forms sign and upload it as well to the system, along with your status card and banking information. We are happy to start people at dates other than September, some programs even start in the spring.

An excellent resource for people thinking of going to school is the WISDOM program being offered in partnership with George Brown College. This program can help you decide where to go with your educational path, and start looking for what you need to get there. Another good resource is OCAS, the Ontario College Application System.

Did you know, colleges and universities have started working together to create pathways where you can attend one, then take most, if not all, of your credits with you to another school and continue there. This can make a lot of difference in several ways. Don't want to go far, far away to that huge university? Check with a local college to find a complementary program. You can become used to the post-secondary atmosphere, learn your way around, and acquire some learning toward your eventual degree.

Interested in a program, but not sure you have the qualifications to succeed, or even to get in? Look into it; see if there is a foundation program you could be eligible for. Have you been out of school for a while? That is ok! You do not have to be a newly graduated high school student to apply for post-secondary.

Perhaps you have been working in the trades for a while, and you have seen how much an apprentice can make. Again, check out your options. Many colleges have excellent skilled trade programs, some which help you become an apprentice.

Maybe you can find your new path through a post-secondary program! We are here to support you on your Lifelong Learning journey, please reach out should you need any support or assistance with this.

Free Tuition at the University of Waterloo, and what it means to You

This is something of an ongoing process for the University and us, so bear with me, please. Any of this information could change as things work out-or don't.

For a new student, applying to University, applications are made to the Ontario University Application Centre, or OUAC. You pay roughly \$150 to apply to up to 3 universities, more money to apply to more. Some university programs require an extra fee. We are still gathering information for a returning student, so just skip the application stuff.

New students can get a voucher to use when applying, so that they are exempt from the fees. You would apply for the voucher either through the MCFN post-secondary office or through your high school guidance office. We are not sure yet how long this process would take, so best to start it sooner than you think you need to. Remember, OUAC opens for applications in October, and closes in February.

You can apply for any undergraduate program or graduate program where you meet the entry requirements. This is important, you still must meet requirements for the program, there is no specific Indigenous entry, just a break on costs once you get there.

Next up, you will need to check out their Quest webpage to verify that you qualify for free tuition. (By the way, did I mention that the giant bill you get for a semester is made up of tuition and Ancillary fees? Ancillary fees run about 35-40% of the tuition itself, so you probably want to apply to Lifelong Learning for funding support anyway).

Members who have exhausted their education funding under the policy can go to Waterloo should you be looking for additional education or for a career change. We can assist you with other funding supports and **dependent on our funding**, we may be able to help with book money, etc. on a case-by-case basis.

MCFN Post-secondary Student Spotlight

Aanii, my name is Sheyrl Racette. I attend Wilfred Laurier University Brantford campus in the Law and Society full time honours program. I preferred this campus due to the location being so closes to home and family. Also, the familiarity helps to ease stress. I am entering my last year and will be applying for a masters program moving forward.

What was the biggest surprise to you?

The biggest surprise with post- secondary vs secondary school is both the quality and quantity of course topics that one has to choose

from. This, in my opinion, enables each student to engage and learn in accordance with their personal goals and interests moving forward. This also enables each student to learn as individuals and supports them in their exploration in finding out who they are and what they want moving forward.

What has your journey been like?

My educational journey has been challenging yet rewarding at the same time. The feeling of having made it through another year is rewarding in itself as this enforces and builds feelings of confidence and re-assurance that a prosperous future is obtainable. A major "key" is to never give up on yourself and keep trudging through until you succeed. MCFN GRADUATION AWARD PROGRAM POLICY AND PROCEDURES



Department of Lifelong Learning

GOAL

The Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation (MCFN) graduation award began in 2005 and provides MCFN students with awards for their academic achievements.

POLICY

The MNCFN Community Trust was established in April of 1997, as a result of an agreement between the MCFN and the Government of Canada. The agreement settled an outstanding Land Claim and the settlement money was set aside in trust for use and benefit of the community as a whole, for now and in the future. The trust funds are managed under the direction of a formal Trust Agreement and administered by eight Trustees and a General Manager.

The MCFN Lifelong Learning Department, in partnership with the MNCFN Community Trust, has created the Graduation Awards Program for the student members of the First Nation. The program provides monetary awards based on the level of education the student completes. From the elementary student to the post-graduate, all are rewarded for their graduation from their programs. The awards program is open to all MCFN members regardless of residency. All members who attend and graduate from an educational institution are eligible for a one time per educational level award. Awards will only be given for current graduation from an Educational Institution. No monetary awards will be given for previous years which were not applied for.

The Department of Lifelong Learning will submit an annual application to the MNCFN Community Trust for ongoing continuation of the Graduation Award Program.

PROCEDURES

- 1. Awards are based on the calendar year (January-December). Awards will be processed once the funding application has been approved by the MNCFN Community Trust.
- 2. The recipient will receive a graduation certificate signed by a member of the Community Trust along with a cheque, honouring their achievement.
- 3. Applications for the January to December calendar year will be accepted until March 31st of the following year.
- 4. I have submitted a photocopy of my graduation transcript or diploma.
- 5. I have submitted a photocopy of my status card.

Wait List Eligibility Criteria and Procedure



Department of Lifelong Learning Early Years Program

The Waiting List application form is available through the MCFN website or at the ECC office, or by emailing your request to <u>shannon.king@mncfn.ca</u> or <u>Katharine.brown@mncfn.ca</u> for an electronic copy.

There is no charge for the waiting list application.

Children are placed on the waiting list in accordance with the Priority Requirements Chart below and then by the date and/or time of the completed forms received at ECC. When a space becomes available, the ECC Supervisor or Assistant Supervisor will contact the family.

Families will be given one week to state their intent in regard to that space. If the space is confirmed and accepted, the Supervisor or Assistant Supervisor will move forward with completing the application process, orientation and payment arrangements.

If the family chooses not to accept the available space, the application will be placed at the bottom of the relevant priority list. A space declined 3 times within 12 months from the first offer will be removed from the waitlist.

ECC respects the privacy and confidentiality of the children on the waitlist. Information will only be shared with the parent/guardian on the application form. The applicant is responsible for keeping up-to-date on the status of their application's position on the waitlist. The applicant must ensure that their contact information is accurate. * Priority may be given to MCFN Guardians or Children if ordered by a Court, Child and Family Services Agency, or supporting documentation from another outside agency requesting that a child be placed in a Child Care setting.

Nibwaakaawin is a tuition-tree career and education exploration course that involves five days of classes (partly online, partly in-person) coupled with a week of oneon-one career coaching.

Life has ups and downs for lots of different reasons. Nibwaakaawin helps you take a step back to ask questions, like "Who am I?", "What is important to me?" and "What will make me happy?"

This program will help you figure out what career and/or educational pathway will be the best fit for you. An **honorarium of \$250.00** will be provided per learner upon completion.

Nibwaakaawin stems from the Menorandum of Understanding (MOU) signed between the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation and George Brown College in 2022. The MOU outlines several initiatives, such as the creation of this program, to increase support and collaboration with our Treaty Partners in the spirit of reciprocity.

Children are placed on the waiting list in accordance with the Priority Requirements Chart below and then by the date and/or time of the completed forms received at ECC. When a space becomes available, the ECC Supervisor or Assistant Supervisor will contact the family.

Families will be given one week to state their intent in regard to that space. If the space is confirmed and accepted, the Supervisor or Assistant Supervisor will move forward with completing the application process, orientation and payment arrangements.

If the family chooses not to accept the available space, the application will be placed at the bottom of the relevant priority list. A space declined 3 times within 12 months from the first offer will be removed from the waitlist.

ECC has 3 emergency child care spaces for MCFN families. These spaces are available as needed for emergency child care only and based on centre capacity and required enrollment documents per the CCEYA, 2014. For more information, please contact the Centre Supervisor or the Early Years Administrator.

ECC respects the privacy and confidentiality of the children on the waitlist. Information will only be shared with the parent/guardian on the application form. The applicant is responsible for keeping up todate on the status of their application's position on the waitlist. The applicant must ensure that their contact information is accurate.
