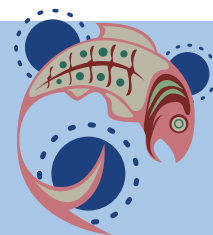

Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation



There is one (1) position for Chief and seven (7) Councillor positions available.

The Election will be held at the Community Centre, 659 New Credit Rd Bldg #4 on Saturday the 9th day of December 2023.

Please note that any voter may nominate candidates by using a mail-in nomination form. You can either deliver or mail-in a written nomination and a completed, signed and witnessed voter declaration form to the Electoral Officer before the time set for the Nomination Meeting OR you may nominate candidates orally at the nomination meeting. Also note that any voter may vote by mail in ballot. If you will not be available to vote in person on the Polling Day, you may make arrangements with the Electoral Officer to receive a mail in ballot.

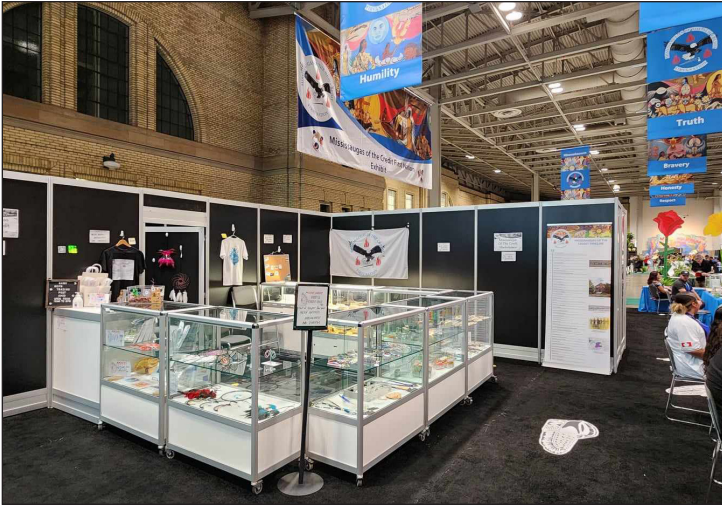

FEDERAL INDIAN DAY SCHOOL CLASS ACTION

Claim Extension

Individuals who attended a Federal Indian Residential School during the day but did not stay overnight (Day Scholars) have until **January 4, 2024** to submit a claim for compensation for the \$10,000 individual compensation.

To request an extension, Claimants must complete an **extension request form**
(see administrator at 1-888-222-6845 or 1-887-877-5786 Class Counsel)
and identify a reason why they have been unable
to submit a claim by the October 4, 2023 deadline.

The extension request form must be submitted together with their claim form no later than **January 4, 2024.**

Celebrating Green Energy at Billy Bishop

PowerON is proud to announce the completion and commissioning of new charging infrastructure at the Billy Bishop Toronto City Airport. These new charging stations will power the incoming fleet of six electric buses to operate between the airport and Union Station. Working in a space-constrained island airport is a very challenging construction environment and, despite this, the project was delivered ahead of schedule and below budget. It's a testament to the skill and effort of the team at PowerON and all our partners.

This project wouldn't have been possible without our partners; a special thank you to Nieuport Aviation and TOK Group for your

We're proud to feature the artwork of Indigenous artist Roma

Maré on our charging station, situated in the main passenger drop-off area that welcomes more than 3 million travellers per year. This piece represents the connection between the land, water, clean electricity system, and the electric buses here at Billy Bishop on the traditional territory of the Mississaugas of the Credit.

PowerON Energy Solutions partnered with artist Roma Mare to create this artwork reflecting the land's history and its connection to the Indigenous community. The Eagle, prominently featured in this artwork, serves as the primary totem for the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation, symbol-

izing its role as a messenger. This majestic bird is also depicted as the emblem of the fifth Council fire on the Eternal Council Fire Belt, commonly known as the Yellowhead Belt. Perched atop a towering pine tree at the Credit, the Eagle signifies vigilance and the swift delivery of messages.

The blue lines represent OPG's 66 hydroelectric power plants across 24 river systems, which collectively make up 40% of the total power generating capacity. For Indigenous people, water is not just for hydration; it is sacred, alive, and possesses a spirit. Water is life.

RELEASE: 2023 EAGLE AWARDS RECIPIENTS ANNOUNCED

Elder Valarie King (Trailblazer Award), Marcus Henry (Soaring Eagle Award), Bo Sault (Community Volunteer Award), and James Shawana (Friend of the First Nation Award) have all been named recipients of the 2023 Eagle Awards.

Valarie King, Edebwed Ogichadaa Kwe (she who speaks the truth, big hearted woman), has spent many years listening to teachings from elders on how she can help those in the Community. She has worked tirelessly to bring back the language, culture, and ceremonies to help the community heal.

“To me it’s just doing my responsibility,” she said.

King will receive the Trailblazer Award. After attending elders conferences she continued to seek more knowledge from other communities, who she said, “gave me more pieces of what I was supposed to be doing.”

This led her into medicines, creating a holistic centre and taking Anishinaabemowin immersion classes.

“That’s one goal I wanted in my life to bring that language back here,” she said.

The recipient of the Soaring Eagle Award (for youth 18 and under) is her grandson, Marcus Henry. He has spent a lot of time learning about MCFN’s history, and he enjoyed sharing that knowledge with others as a Volunteer at several events including the CNE. Each event he is feeling more comfortable and confident.

He is also a firekeeper who takes his responsibility very seriously because he provides a space for others to gather and talk, while he also gets to learn.

“I enjoy being firekeeper for the stories that I hear,” he said. “It gives me peace and proving that safe space for people to feel safe, to share, and the part of just connecting.”

King is proud to receive an award at the same ceremony as her grandson.

The recipient of the Community Volunteer award, Charles Ellsworth (Bo) Sault recently moved back to the community after overcoming a battle with addiction and dove into learning about the culture, helping with events and volunteering anywhere he could.

“I feel honoured,” he said. “I’m very proud to be Anishinaabe. I’m proud of being from here. It’s just I didn’t even know what to say when I got the letter. It seems like more people are noticing that I’m changing my life around. Without the help of these people here I wouldn’t have been able to do it. I tried for 25 years.”





Sault helped build a lodge in the sugar bush, participated in eight sweat lodges, and received his Anishinaabe name this summer. He says he's found the place he feels like he belongs, and he couldn't have done it without the help of so many community members, friends, and family.

James Shawana, Potawatomi Odawa, has taught Anishinaabemowin at Lloyd S. King for almost 15 years. He will receive the Friend of MCFN Award for consistently showing up for the Community and youth.

"It's an honour. It is a big honour to receive any award, to be recognized for the work you've done," he said.

He is a fluent Anishinaabemowin speaker and grew up speaking the language as his first language. He believes learning the language brings people closer to the culture and to their ancestors.

"It's important to know your language. Language is your culture, culture is your language," he said. "It is important because of what happened, how they took it away from us."

We would like to thank the many families who came to the office to complete the student information sheets. These sheets are needed to schedule the bus times and for future contact for bussing and information sharing. We would like to share with the Community that the Department of Lifelong Learning handed out over 70 back-to-school supply packages to high school & post-secondary students.

The Post-Secondary Advisor and Lifelong Learning Clerk will be attending the Career Fair on October 18th at the MCFN Community Centre. We will be there to answer your Post-Secondary questions. Please come visit us at our booth for some special swag!

From our Post-Secondary Advisor Bernadette O'Grady Bomberry

Starting Fall 2024, Niagara College will be offering a four-year nursing degree program-BScN, an Honours Bachelor of Science in Nursing. The program will highlight compassionate care for patients.

Durham College is opening two new labs, an EV and a PEOTO lab. The EV is to offer specialized Electric Vehicle knowledge. The PROTO brings together industry, academic, and students to develop prototype solutions.

As long as everyone is talking about the free tuition at Waterloo...Waterloo has announced they are planning to build a 500-student residence. Built with Indigenous design principles in mind, construction will start July of 2024 and be finished in time for Fall of 2026.

Everybody knows about the Native University Access Program (NUAP) at Polytech, right? Well, did you know that Algoma University, Sault Ste. Marie campus has the same sort of program? They offer two semesters/one year of a pre-university qualifying program, that gives students essential university study skills while allowing them to take courses specific to their educational stream. For instance, you could apply directly to the university for the AUAP or through the Ontario University Application Centre (OUAC) for your desired course-say Environmental Science. Your 8 credits for the year would include some specific to that stream, like pre-calculus.

At the Brampton campus, they are also offering a high school/university program called LEAP. Learners Early Access Program offers university courses while equity deserving students' complete grades 11 and 12 on the university campus, thus giving students a familiarity with post-secondary. To quote Algoma U President Asima Vezina: "We know that many of these students will be the first in their family to go to university—and we know that the first is rarely the last."

Speaking of University Access programs, did you know Concordia University has an Indigenous bridging program to a Bachelor of Engineering program? This program goes for three terms, in cohorts so you move through it with the same group, and are supported throughout by the Otsenhakta Student Centre and mentors.

Oh, did I forget to mention Lakehead? Lakehead University also has a specific Indigenous Transition Year Program, for students who don't have the regular qualifications for who need more academic preparation to be a successful university student. This program gives three credits, which may apply toward your degree. The small class size makes it more comfortable and supportive.

Centennial College has opened what they call the A-Building. Specific Indigenous design ideas were incorporated into the zero-carbon building, including special exhaust fans to incorporate smudging. This expansion includes flexible classrooms that support indigenous ways of teaching and being as well there are support areas such as Wisdom Hall which is an engaging student touchdown space, along with collaborative spaces, admin offices and food service. This looks like an exciting space for students!

My name is Jaiden Herkimer and I am currently doing my Masters in Psychological Science at Toronto Metropolitan University.

What was your biggest surprise?

The biggest surprise I have had while attending post-secondary is how many amazing mentors, friends, and colleagues I have met along the way. I did not expect to meet so many like-minded people who were willing to help guide me through school and give me advice. That made all the difference and made a big positive impact on my post-secondary experience.

What has your journey been like?

I started my undergraduate degree in 2017 and graduated with my BA Honors Psychology degree in 2021. I have always liked reading and writing, but during my degree I realized how much I enjoy doing research. So, I took a year off before starting my MA and worked as a research assistant at Indspire. Here I did research on Indigenous people's educational attainment and outcomes in Canada. I wanted to help support other Indigenous students who might be facing similar challenges as I did in post-secondary. After Indspire, I moved downtown Toronto to start at Toronto Met for my MA. I do psychology research, specifically on social and political issues. Right now, I am doing my thesis on understanding settlers' support for Truth and Reconciliation and Indigenous activism movements (Every Child Matters, Land Back, and MMIWG2S+), how we can increase allyship, and reduce anti-Indigenous racism. I also want to do community-led research and give people a platform to let their voices be heard. The support from the Lifelong Learning department has been extremely valuable in my education journey, so thank you!

Have some advice for others?

You may not know exactly what you want to do or where you will end up in your education and career, but as long as you follow what you are passionate about, it will work out. Also, make sure to always research out for support if you need it. There are usually resources available. And don't be too hard on yourself (that's definitely something I have struggled with).

Where might your course take you in your future?

As of right now, I am thinking about doing my PhD in Psychological Science after my MA. I am still deciding between being a university or college professor/researcher or working for a community organization or non-profit. I guess we will see where my path takes me! :)

Grand Erie Approves Appointment of Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation Trustee



During Grand Erie's Regular Board meeting on Monday, September 25, Tammy Sault assumed the role of trustee, representing the interests, under the Education Services Agreement, of Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation (MCFN) students who attend Grand Erie schools.

"I am honoured to have been appointed to this very important role with the Grand Erie District School Board," said Tammy Sault. "Representing our students from Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation is a privilege that I look forward to upholding. Ensuring that all nation members are supported throughout their educational journey is a priority not only for me, but also for our community as a whole."

Sault is the first trustee appointed to represent MCFN learners in Grand Erie. The region the board serves encompasses the First Nation communities of Mississaugas of the Credit and Six Nations of the Grand River. Sault will join Claudine VanEvery-Albert, trustee representing the interests of learners from Six Nations of the Grand River. It marks the first time more than one trustee representing Indigenous learners has been appointed to the board.

"On behalf of the board, we know Ms. Sault will bring dedication, advocacy and commitment to public education in this role, and will play a crucial part in shaping learners' achievement, well-being and sense of belonging in our schools," said Susan Gibson, Chair of Grand Erie District School Board. "This is a unique role with responsibilities to the community and to the school board."

The appointment follows a motion put forward at the regular board meeting in March of this year, approving the representation for the remainder of the current 2022-26 term of the board.

"We are very pleased that Grand Erie District School Board has decided to recognize the value in adding a seat for the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation," said Stacey LaForme, elected Chief of the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation (MCFN). "It is a testament to the board to recognize that MCFN is a unique First Nation, and adding our voice is a step towards reconciliation."

Sault brings a wealth of leadership experience to the new role, holding various roles within the First Nation including Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation classroom teacher, Special Education Resource teacher, and as an Indigenous voice at the table for Grand Erie's Special Education Advisory Committee.

"The Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation and Six Nations of the Grand River trustees represent their communities, advocating actively for learners, and ensuring the board's work aligns with their best interests," said JoAnna Roberto, Director of Education. "We are honoured to have Ms. Sault join us on our learning journey."

Grand Erie District School Board represents more than 27,000 students in 58 elementary schools and 14 secondary schools within the City of Brantford and the counties of Brant, Haldimand, and Norfolk as well as students from Six Nations of the Grand River and Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation. With a dedicated staff of more than 2,900, Grand Erie is committed to learning, leading, and inspiring.

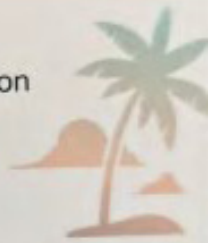

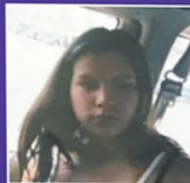
